Despite the fact that the 6th annual Hot Spring County American Cancer Society (ACS) Relay for Life was cancelled on its original date due to inclement weather, Hot Spring County residents managed to exceed the goal set for this year's Relay by nearly \$8,000. (\$77,827.77 was raised.) What an accomplishment!



OUACHITA TECH STUDENT, CANCER SURVIVOR RECEIVES \$2,500 CARTI JUNGMEYER SCHOLARSHIP

Amanda French, a 20-year-old incoming student at Ouachita Technical College, is among 28 pediatric cancer survivors selected to receive Dennis Jungmeyer Scholarships valued at \$2,500 each and awarded by the CARTI Foundation.

Presented annually to current or former CARTI pediatric cancer patients, the scholarships are named in honor of North Little Rock resident Dennis Jungmeyer, a CARTI Foundation Board Member and a cancer survivor.

For the past 17 years, Jungmeyer has worked with the Arkansas Automobile Dealers Association and the Independent Insurance Agents of Arkansas to organize the annual CARTI Kids Memorial Golf Classic, the proceeds of which benefit the CARTI Foundation. To date, the tournament has raised more than \$1.5 million for the CARTI Kids program.

A graduate of Benton High, French was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma in 2001 and is the daughter of Sharon & Estol French of Benton. French will begin classes this fall at Ouachita Technical College in Malvern, where she will study nursing.

"I knew people who had cancer," said French. "Most of them had died from it, and I was not willing to go down like that. Jackie Chan could take me out any day of the week, but there was no way I would be defeated by an uninvited guest in my body."


"Nothing was for sure, but I was preparing for the worst," she recalled. "The words came like a speeding bullet, and all at once the tears of emotion and tough decisions came flowing down my face. Cancer was not in my 20-year plan, but thanks to the research I had done on the topic, I knew what had to be done. Treat it, and beat it!"

"God knew what was in store for me," French said. "I just had to go along for the ride. I never wanted to be a burden to anyone, but I have learned that there are special people who take it upon themselves to share the load of grief and anxiety brought on by an unexpected challenge."

"Through this experience, I have been able to define who I am as an individual and have come to the realization that no one can make it alone," said French.
