# OUACHITA TECHNICAL COLLEGE ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE DEGREE MANUFACTURING TECHNOLOGY

### **Emphasis in Industrial Equipment Maintenance Technology**

The Manufacturing Technology curriculum is designed to provide the essential skills needed by students to prepare them for professional technical careers in industry and business. Industry needs trained industrial maintenance technicians to meet the demands of production and quality. This degree plan prepares students in the required critical thinking skills, technical skills, and communication skills needed by American industry today. Students successfully completing the degree will be able to meet industries's needs today, and learn new technologies as they emerge.

#### **General Education Outcomes**

- 1. Students will use communication skills necessary to read and listen for understanding, to speak and write clearly, and to follow written and verbal instructions.
- 2. Students will solve problems using basic principles of mathematics.
- 3. Students will use critical thinking skills to identify problems, analyze alternative solutions, and make appropriate decisions for themselves, business, and society.
- 4. Students will demonstrate teamwork and leadership skills and the ability to adapt to the ever-changing workplace environment.
- 5. Students will use available resources, time, materials, and equipment efficiently and effectively.
- 6. Students will develop a commitment to continued learning to remain employable in the job market.

### **Broad Technology Outcomes**

- 1. Students will develop the ability to visualize and interpret mechanical drawings and architectural, electrical, and electronic blueprints.
- Students will learn the basic principles of DC and AC electricity, including; Ohm's Law, series and parallel circuits, network theorems, magnetism, RC, LC, RLC, and transformer circuits. Students will also prove competency through laboratory experiments.
- Students will apply computer technology to complete tasks effectively and efficiently. Through learning current software applications (word processing, spreadsheets, and database), students will apply technological concepts that are of lasting value rather than mastery of specific hardware/software skills and knowledge.
- 4. Students will learn electrician skills through practical hands-on training. Skills included are; bending and running conduit, wiring actual electrical circuits, using proper electrical tools and benders, installing and repairing breaker/fuse boxes, and meeting electrical code requirements.
- 5. Students will learn skills, required by virtually all industry today, in industrial safety, safety equipment, OSHA regulations, safety management, and environmental concerns. Modern industry requires technical personnel to work safely and obey safety rules. Students will learn through lecture, demonstration, and written assignments.
- 6. Students will learn the technical mathematic skills required to be proficient in the calculations that are so much a part of technical skills today. With this knowledge, students will be able to advance in their mathematical skills in the future, and meet employer requirements for technical work.

7. Students will learn the fundamentals of using an industrial metal-cutting lathe and horizontal mill. Students will meet industry standards of layout, measurement, and cutting.

### **Industrial Equipment Maintenance Core Outcomes**

- Students will develop competency in industrial fluid power (hydraulics and pneumatics). Mastery of basic hydraulic and pneumatic components like pumps, cylinders, and valves will be required, along with the critical thinking skills required to install and troubleshoot systems.
- 2. Students will develop an understanding of basic mechanical concepts, such as gears systems, pulley and chain drive systems, and gear boxes through the use of lecture and practical hands-on laboratory exercises.
- 3. Students will develop skills in basic industrial power transmission equipment, such as gear boxes, conveyors, transmissions, couplings, and drive components through lecture and laboratory exercises.
- 4. Students will develop skills in basic compression refrigeration equipments, its components, wiring, troubleshooting, and servicing through lecture and hands-on training.
- 5. Students will develop competency in basic welding, cutting, and braising techniques as required by industry through lecture and hands-on training

# OUACHITA TECHNICAL COLLEGE ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE DEGREE MANUFACTURING TECHNOLOGY

Emphasis in Industrial Equipment Maintenance Technology

IEMT 1102 Wiring Methods: Wiring methods is a course designed to give the student practical hands-on experience in electrical wiring techniques. Students will learn all conduit and wire terminology, wire and conduit sizes and their proper use, how to properly bend and install electrical conduit and pull wire, how to properly install breaker boxes and power panels, and how to solder and de-solder. (2,1,3) F, S

IEMT 1104 Fundamentals of Electricity: This course introduces the non-electronics student to the basic concepts of D.C. and A.C. electricity. All topics of D.C. circuits are covered, including current flow, voltage, power and resistance, Ohm's Law, complex circuits, and magnetism. In A.C., coils, capacitors, transformers, and their associated formulae are introduced. Three-phase voltage is also discussed. This course will enable the student to gain an understanding of the essentials of electricity and electrical power. Prerequisite: Basic Algebra Test Score. (4,3,3) F, S

IEMT 1203 Fluid Power (Hydraulics and Pneumatics): This course covers the principles of hydraulic and pneumatic equipment and their uses and application in industry. Some of the topics covered in this class include: hydraulic pumps, control valves, cylinders, seals, air compressors, filters, pressure regulators, pressure control valves, and flow controls. (3,2,3) §

IEMT 1213 Mechanical Devices and Systems: This class is an overview of the principles, concepts, and applications of mechanisms found in an Industrial plant. Topics covered include belt drive systems, chains, chain drives, conveyor belts, conveyor systems, bearings, sheaves, lubrication, sprockets, and mechanical fasteners. Lab will be used to emphasize practical maintenance, installation, and procedures for repair and replacement. (3,2,3) F

IEMT 2202 Industrial Power Transmission Equipment: In this course the student will be introduced to heavy duty power transmission equipment such as clutches, transmissions, gear boxes, gear drives, torque converters, couplings and drive lines. Instruction covers theory of operation and industrial applications for these devices. Lab will focus on maintenance and installation of this type of equipment. (2,1,3) Offered every other Spring

IEMT 2413 Industrial Safety: Industrial Safety is a course designed to provide all students with the basic safety knowledge required in today's industrial workplace. It is also designed to give the supervisor, or future supervisor, the necessary tools to manage a safe work environment. With a knowledge of industrial hazards, and the skills required to correct them, the worker or supervisor will be better equipped to deal with today's modern industrial environment. Topics covered include: Accident reduction, safety training, safety involvement, safety inspections, accident investigations, industrial hygiene, ergonomics, machine safeguarding, tool safety, materials handling safety, electrical and fire safety, hazard communication, and an introduction to hazardous chemical safety. (3,3,0) F, S

ACHR 1123 Basic Compression Refrigeration: A series of lectures and demonstrations on compression refrigeration components, system accessories, refrigerants, temperature pressure charts, purging and evacuation, pressurizing and leak testing, charging, basic refrigeration cycle, and refrigerant recovery/recycling. (3,2,3) Offered every other Spring

WELD 1112 Introduction to Welding: In this class a student will be introduced to basic safety and welding procedures, including striking an arc, running a bead, gas safety, and simple gas welding and cutting procedures, identifying and using correct welding roods, and simple brazing. This course is a co-requisite for welding students in their first semester of school. (2,1,3) F, S

MACH 1103 Basic Blueprint Reading: This is a basic course designed for the person pursuing a career in any of the manufacturing and industrial fields. It is a study to help the student develop the basic skills required for visualizing and interpreting mechanical drawings and blueprints. Persons seeking careers in engineering, architectural, mechanical, electrical, and electronics fields will benefit from visualizing shapes, line usage, dimensioning and tolerancing, notes and symbols. Prerequisites: MATH 1003 Basic Math with a grade of "C" or above or ASSET or ACT score of 14 or above in Math. (3,3,0) F, S, SU

MACH 1113 Introduction to Machining I: This course is designed to cover a broad area of technology in the machine shop for those persons interested in any of the mechanical fields of manufacturing and industry. It is a comprehensive study in the identification, care, and use of hand tools and precision measuring instruments, and a study of basic machining concepts and basic Metallurgy as it applies to metal identification and heat treating. It involves practice in the use of Machine Shop bench work procedures, basic layout, use of hand taps and dies and deals with reading basic blueprints, using layout tools, measuring instruments, and setup tools in the process of constructing parts while learning the basic care and operation of utility grinders, power saws, drill presses, engine lathes, and milling machines. The student should develop an understanding of the most basic ideas and concepts needed in the machine shop and develop skills that are absolutely essential for further progress in the machine trades. All other courses of study in the machine shop program will build upon the

materials learned in this course. Persons interested in careers in the related maintenance fields will also use the materials covered in this course. Practical application is provided with "hands-on" experience in the machine shop. Safety is stressed as an integral part of this program. Prerequisite: Basic Math (MATH 1003) with a grade of "C" or above or ASSET or ACT score of 14 or above in Math. (3,2,3) F

MACH 1123 Basic Lathe Technology: This is one of a series of courses designed to help the person desiring a career as a machinist. It is a study of the setup, care and operation of the engine lathe and its accessories. It is a program of study to help the student understand the construction, setup, and use of the metal turning lathe. The student will learn the theory of "turning" on the engine lathe including operations such as turning, boring, tapering, threading, drilling and tapping. The student will learn the techniques involved in selecting, grinding, and setting up of the cutting tools used in these operations, including both high speed steel and carbide tools. The student must combine the cognitive skills learned in this course with the cognitive skills learned in the Basic Machine Shop Operations course and both are to be applied to the projects produced in the shop. Prerequisites or Co-requisite: MACH 1113 Basic Machine Shop Operations. (3,2,3) F

MACH 1223 Basic Milling Technology: This course is one of a series of major courses designed to help the person desiring a career as a machinist. It is a study of the basic setup, care and operation of vertical and horizontal milling machines and their accessories. The student will learn the use of standard and special cutters, methods of holding them in the machine, correct cutter speeds and table feeds and the particular techniques involved in cutting different shapes and types of metals, and the methods of holding the work. Special cutting techniques will include boring holes using an adjustable boring head and cutting keyseats and drilling hole patterns using both jig boring procedures and use of the rotary table. Safety is stressed. Upon completion of this course the student should be able to set up the milling machine, selecting the proper cutters and proper speeds, feeds, and depth of cut to produce a part from a blueprint. This includes use of the vise, rotary table, boring head and jig boring procedures. Prerequisite or Co-requisite: MACH 1103 Basic Blueprint Reading, and MACH 1113 Basic Machine Shop Operations. (3,2,3) Offering is based on student interest.

MACH 2103 Introduction to CAD: Computer Aided Drafting is an introductory course for the technician or the person seeking to draft for a living. Engineers, architects, mechanical, electrical, and electronics persons all need the ability to complete finished drawings of parts and structures. Manufacturers rely on computer drawings of parts and other manufactured goods. This course expands on MACH 1103 Basic Blueprint Reading. It will explore the use of CAD graphics software through the use of microcomputers, plotters and printers. Included will be operations through logging-on and off, geometric entity creations, zooming, dimensioning, moving, plotting, layering, mirroring, saving, and recalling drawings. Upon completion of this course the student should be able to produce a useful mechanical drawing using the microcomputer and

plotter or printer. This course requires considerable work outside of class time. Prerequisite or Corequisite: MACH 1103 Basic Blueprint Reading. (3,3,0) F

DATA 1113 Introduction to Computers: This course stresses a working knowledge of computer concepts, hardware, software, networks, e-mail, and the Internet. It also provides hands-on applications in word processing, spreadsheet, and database management. Keyboarding skills are strongly recommended. F, S, SU

ENGL 1113 Freshman Composition I: A course designed primarily to develop in the student the ability to think coherently and to write clearly and effectively, to gain knowledge of the structure of the language, and to read with understanding and appreciation. The course includes the study of grammar and its application in the short essay (350-500 words). Prerequisite: Basic Composition (ENGL 1013) with a grade of "C" or better; or required placement test score. F, S, SU

ENGL 1203 Technical Writing: This course is designed to give students application in organizing and writing support documents for business reports found in business and industry. Emphasis will be placed on style, audience analysis, editing, and graphs.

MATH 1133 Technical Math: This course, which develops competencies in geometry, trigomonetry, vectors, and logarithms, is designed to expose students to technical mathematics and how it is used in technology.

PHYC 1124 Introduction to Physics: A general education course for NON-MAJORS introducing the scientific method in the study of the dynamic laws governing the physical universe. A study will be conducted of the forces that arise from mechanics, heat, light, gravity, electricity, and magnetism. The class will meet five hours per week (three hours of lecture and two hours of lab). Prerequisite: Intermediate Algebra (MATH 1023) with a grade of "C" or better; or required placement test score. F. S. SU

PSYC 2133 Industrial Psychology: A consideration of the application of psychology to such areas as personnel work, human engineering, motivation, job satisfaction, leadership, and organizational structure.

### Ouachita Technical College enrollment tops 1000

Ouachita Technical College has set a record enrollment for the spring 2002 semester. A total of 1,008 students are registered for credit classes.

Dr. Barry Ballard, OTC President, said this number represents a 4 percent increase over the previous record of 968 set in fall 2001 and a 21 percent increase over the spring 2001 enrollment of 831.

"The College projects enrollment will continue to increase during the 2002-2003 academic year,," Ballard said. "Programs in information technology, early childhood education, practical nursing, medical transcription, and general studies for university transfer continue to grow. We also have plans to add other high demand career programs and courses."

Ouachita Technical College was recently named as one of the nation's 50 fastest-growing two-year colleges. According to a report in *Community College Week*, OTC ranked 27<sup>th</sup> among the Top 50 Fastest Growing Public Two-Year Colleges with fewer than 2,500 students.

In addition to college-credit classes, OTC also provides non-credit instruction to over 2,000 students per year through its adult education programs, high school career center, business and industry training programs, and avocational courses.

## OTC accredited to 2010

Ouachita Technical College in Malvern has reached another milestone. An evaluation team from the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools has recommended ten-year accreditation – the maximum that can be granted.

"This recommendation is an affirmation of the quality education and services received by students who attend OTC," said June Prince, OTC's Accreditation Coordinator. "This is the same accreditation granted to four-year colleges and universities."

After becoming an accredited institution in 1995, Ouachita Technical College began planning for 2000 when it would be up for reaccreditation. This meant that the next five years would entail numerous meetings, strenuous planning, and a great deal of hard work.

That hard work has paid off for the two-year college. Four members that made up the North Central Association evaluation team visited the campus September 25 - 27. The team members were: Chair - Dr. Jack Bottenfield, President of Eastern Wyoming College in Torrington, Wyoming; Dr. Sue Darby, Dean of Instruction at Hutchinson Community College in Hutchinson, Kansas; Dr. Larry Alan Lundblad, Vice President of the Institution and Academic Affairs at South Central Technical College in North Mankato, Minnesota; and Ms. Gail S. Odneal, Health Science Division Chair at Monroe County Community College in Monroe, Michigan.

In preparation for this visit, OTC board members, faculty, staff, and administration compiled information and conducted research in order to complete a self-examination that is required before any NCA evaluation visit. While at OTC, the team members met with various representing groups and poured over the self-study report and shelves of documents including OTC's Assessment Report, Accountability Report, scrapbooks containing newspaper articles and advertisements, minutes from various committee meetings, and many other OTC documents.

As the team concluded their three day visit, an exit interview was held with OTC's President's Cabinet consisting of Dr. Ken Martin, President; Dr. Susan Azbell, Vice-President and Provost; Dr. Roger Coomer, Vice-President of Finance and Administration; Ms. June Prince, Vice-President of Planning and Assessment and NCA Coordinator; Ms. Linda Johnson, Dean of Enrollment Management and Registrar; and Mr. Bob Washington, Director of Center for Workforce Excellence. The team left with a recommendation of the maximum ten-year accreditation for Ouachita Technical College.

Not only did OTC achieve NATEF Master Certification, they are also receiving special recognition from NATEF in Applied Academic and Workplace Skills. This is a special award given to schools that have outstanding programs in Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science. Instructors who will receive special recognition for their part are: Language Arts - Ronnie Thompson, Mathematics - Terri Colananni, and Science - Milton Purdy.

Because the automobile has become so technical, NATEF recognized the need for future automotive technicians to be literate beyond the high school level. HIGH SCHOOLERS GET A JUMP START ON COLLEGE By Sharon Growney-Seals

It is unusual to be both a high school and college student at the same time. Yet, many high school students in the Malvern area graduate with several hours of college credit under their belts, thanks to Ouachita Technical College and Arkansas' Concurrent Education Enrollment Act. High school students who enroll in college classes get both high school and college credit for their work. And that's just one advantage to the program.

Malvern High School senior Emily Holt took Freshman Composition I and II and College Algebra, courses which were taught on the high school campus by Ouachita Technical College instructors during the regular school day. Holt says, "I learned more than just English and Algebra in the classes I took this year. The different methods of grading and teaching made me realize what a big step it is from high school to college." Students who are planning to go to college can complete core curriculum classes, which frees the students who go on to four-year colleges to concentrate more quickly on courses in their field. But at the same time, the classes offered under the Concurrent Education Enrollment Act let students experience college while they are still in the familiar surroundings of their high schools.

Glen Rose High School senior Monica Martin got a jump-start to her college career by completing English Composition. Martin said, "I believe taking this course has better prepared me for the level of writing that will be required in college. I am glad I had the -MORE-

opportunity to take this course and would encourage others to do so." Martin plans to attend Lyon College this fall.

Besides preparing students to tackle upper level college courses, concurrent enrollment has other advantages. It allows parents to spread out the expense of college; it allows students who are uncertain if they want to attend college full time to get a "sample" of what courses are like; and the convenient locations eliminate long commutes. The program also has little interference with students' work schedules, as the classes usually take place during the standard school day. Yet another advantage is the small class size. Rarely will concurrent education classes have over twenty students in them, which for many students eliminates the overwhelming feeling that comes from walking into an enormous math class at a big university.

"Taking a college course while still in high school helped me in many ways," says

Katy Hohrine, who just graduated from Malvern High School. "I learned responsibility
because of a strict attendance policy and . . . the method of grading. I got a head start to

college life. This will help me to not be quite as intimidated . . ."

Ouachita Technical College offers concurrent enrollment programs for students at various high schools, including Magnet Cove High School, Malvern High School, Ouachita High School in Donaldson, Poyen High School, Bryant High School, and Glen Rose High School. During the 1997-1998 academic year, approximately 120 students took advantage of the Concurrent Education Enrollment Act to participate in diverse core curriculum classes, such as Oral Communications, Composition I and II, Intermediate Algebra, College Algebra, and Psychology. 

Dr. Marvin Schultz prepared and submitted a grant proposal to the Foundation Executive Council which he had hoped to present at the Foundation Retreat. The proposal is entitled, A Grant Proposal for the Purpose of Improving the Teaching of Arkansas History in the Public Schools of Clark, Dallas, Grant, Hot Spring, and Benton Counties. Dr. Schultz said due to recent legislation a group of teachers are being asked to teach an Arkansas History class which they were not required to take to get a history degree. He said the Foundation could provide a real service by offering scholarships for teachers to take the course at OTC beginning in the 1998 Spring Semester.

Ms. Etienne expressed full support of the proposal presented by Dr. Schultz. Mr. Tackett asked if this will be an annual proposal, and Dr. Schultz stated it will probably be done for at least the next two or three years and then the focus will shift to e-mail and Internet courses. Mr. Tackett made a motion, seconded by Ms. McCrackin, and passed unanimously, to approve a grant to provide Foundation scholarships to assist teachers in getting the skills to teach Arkansas History in the public schools. Mr. Tackett suggested getting the newspaper to interview Dr. Schultz for a possible article advertising the availability of this history course.

The meeting adjourned at 1:10 p.m. The next Foundation Executive Council meeting will be held on Thursday, January 15, 1998, at 12:00 noon, to be followed in the evening with a full Foundation Board meeting beginning at 5:30 p.m.

The new HOPE Scholarship and other features included in the federal Tax Relief Act of 1997 promise to make an education at Ouachita Technical College an even better bargain this spring than it has been in the past.

Technically not a "scholarship" but a tax-credit, the HOPE legislation allows eligible students pursuing the first two years of postsecondary education to receive a tax credit for 100 percent of the first \$1000 of tuition and fees and 50 percent of the second \$1000 on their federal income tax. A tax credit means a deduction from your tax liability which is much better than a tax deduction.

"If you owe \$500 in taxes and you have a \$200 tax credit, you will owe only \$300 in taxes," says Dr. Roger Coomer, Dean of Finance and Administration at Ouachita Technical College.

Students must be enrolled at least half-time (6 credit hours) in a degree, certificate, or other program leading to a recognized education credential to receive the credit. The measure takes effect January 1, 1998, and applies to education provided in academic periods beginning after that date. Students wishing to receive the tax credit for the spring semester should wait until after January 1 to pay their tuition and fees.

HOPE does come with a few strings attached. Individual filers who earn more than \$50,000, and joint filers with adjusted gross income exceeding \$100,000 do not qualify. In addition, students who have been convicted of a felony for the possession or distribution of a controlled substance are ineligible. And students who receive other forms of financial aid such as a Pell Grant will have the amount of their eligibility for HOPE reduced by the amount of aid they receive.

Dale Jordan was born in 1931 in the middle of the dust bowl of the American southwest. His childhood education was in a one-room rural school where he experienced small group learning, peer tutoring, and an informal type of individualized instruction. His undergraduate degree was in English and philosophy at Oklahoma Baptist University. Following a European tour of duty in the U.S. Army, Jordan earned a master's degree in elementary education at Oklahoma State University. In 1957 he began several years of classroom teaching when there were no special programs for struggling learners. This hands-on experience with learning differences eventually led him to the University of Oklahoma where he earned a Ph.D. in educational psychology and reading education. During his doctoral studies, Iordan began researching LD patterns in prison populations, the military, and the workplace. He joined the editorial staff of the Economy Company to produce an acclaimed basal reading program. He spent several years as director of a university reading clinic where he developed field-based experiences for reading teachers with dyslexic learners. In 1973 Jordan established a private practice in diagnosing and treating learning disabilities. For 17 years the Jordan Diagnostic Center in Oklahoma City worked with struggling learners from around the world. In 1990 Jordan moved to Arkansas to be director of the Jones Learning Center at the University of the Ozarks. In 1993 he joined the graduate faculty in adult education at the University of Arkansas in Little Rock.

Throughout his career, Jordan has been a prolific author and workshop presenter. In 1972 he published the landmark study *Dyslexia in the Classroom* with Charles E. Merrill. He

was co-developer of the D'Nealian writing program for Scott Foresman and Company. 
