

A Building Committee meeting was held immediately after the regular board meeting for the college to inform representatives of the Malvern City Council of the progress on the OTC building project.

Martin told the three-member contingent from the city council the college is ready to go ahead with the plans, but some cooperation from the city council is


needed.

The council has been collecting the money from the half-cent sales tax, so any building built with that money would belong to the city. In order for the college to use any state-provided funds, the building would have to be owned by the college.

In order for the two funding sources to work together, the city will have to agree to deed over the building to the college when construction is complete, Martin

said.



The Ouachita Technical College Board of Trustees welcomed a new member to the board and elected a new chairman and vice chairman at Tuesday's regular

monthly meeting. Pete Paladino was appointed to the board by Arkansas Gov-ernor Jim Guy Tucker to fill the unexpired term of former chairman Jim Ferguson, who has accepted a job offer out of state. The term will expire on June 30.

Vice Chairman Steve Faris was elected to fill the chairman's slot and Lacy Landers was moved into the vice chairman position.
