Teachers inducted into SHS Hall of Fame; seniors honored

SHERIDAN — Former teachers Bobby Graves and Mary Frances Harper were recently inducted into the Sheridan High School Hall of Fame during an awards banquet in the school cafeteria. Also honored during the event were seniors receiving scholarships, seniors with a 3.75 GPA and those who had received a regional, state or national award.

Guest speaker Dr. Barry Ballard, president of Ouachita Technical College in Malvern, encouraged the honored seniors to take advantage of their potential,

savor every moment, honor each other, not allow poor decisions to derail them — to dream the impossible dream.

An educator in the Sheridan School District for 36 years, Graves was recipient of the 1990 Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics, and was recognized as Outstanding Secondary Educator in 1986-87 by the Sheridan Chamber of Commerce. Assisting in directing and editing a film documentary on the first 100 years of Sheridan schools, she was also involved in compiling a book on the sub-

Current director of the Literacy Council of Grant County, Harper and her late husband of 32 years had two children and 12 grandchildren.

Hot Spring County Relay For Life raises \$77,777.77

MALVERN — The American Cancer Society (ACS) has \$77,777.77 more for the fight against the dreaded disease as a result of Relay For Life in Hot Spring County this year. The original date for the event was changed because of bad weather, but the sixth annual Hot Spring County Relay For Life exceeded its fund-raising goal by more than \$8,000.

A great number of people participated in a ceremony in which more than 700 luminaries, dedicated in memory of cancer victims or in honor of survivors of cancer, raised \$3,550, Malvern Mayor Steve

Northcutt announced.

More than 8.9 million cancer survivors are alive today, and an estimated 1.2 million people in the United States will be diagnosed with cancer this year, and 14,200 new cases are expected to be diagnosed in Arkansas.

The ACS will contribute \$100 million towards cancer research this year and most is raised through Relay for Life events across the nation.

Every known method of detecting cancer (ultrasound, MRIs, CAT scans, mammograms and more) was discovered by researchers who received grants from the ACS. Every penny, dime and dollar raised at these events offers hope to everyone who has been or will be touched by this disease, and it brings us one

step closer to a cancer-free tomorrow.

Rezoning fails to gain introduction at MCC

■ The former Aalf's Manufacturing property doesn't get rezoned to light industrial use category in Malvern City Council meeting.

The Malvern City Council heard a presentation on computer linking of all city offices Monday, and an ordinance rezoning property failed to gain introduction.

The ordinance rezoning the former Aalf's Manufacturing from commercial to light industrial use, petitioned by Scott Vise of CMI, had already met opposition.

The property borders Perla's city limits, and several neighbors to the property objected to changing its zoning to industrial. Their objections were at least partially based on a recent fire at the Jones Mill location of CMI.

No council member introduced the ordinance for consideration and it failed.

A graduate and a student from Ouachita Technical College presented the council with information from OTC's Cisco Networking Academy.

The two women, Dawn Perry and Angela Roberts, designed a plan with city hall as the axis of a wireless network, with secondary networks to include the police department, fire department buildings, Chamber of Commerce, street department and water department.

All departments would connect to the Internet through the city hall server, and the proposal recommended Small Business

DSL. DSL would cost \$524.65 monthly, with a \$350 setup fee, compared to a frame relay cost of \$2,184 monthly.

Perry and Roberts presented three total estimates for different products. Belkin products would have a total cost of \$19,749, or \$34,715 with routers and new computers. D Link would cost \$20,476, or \$35,442 with the additional computers and routers. Cisco products would cost \$22,269, or \$37,235 with the routers and computers.

"For anyone who needs anything city hall provides, they can reach it 24 hours a day," program coordinator Jerry Littles said.

The council will consider the proposal further but took no action Monday.

The council adopted an ordinance rezoning property owned by OTC from industrial to commercial usage, with an emergency clause for immediate effect. Allied Health is to construct a building on the property, which had to be rezoned for the company to locate there.

The council presented commendations to Malvern firefighters, 911 dispatchers, EMTs and a deputy for their performance at a May 10 accident.

Malvern Mayor Steve Northcutt witnessed the accident, which included a vehicle rolling several times and catching fire, and wrote a letter to the council, praising the people involved.

Those receiving commendations included Sheriff's deputy Brian Bailey, fire Captains Sherman Prince and Ronnie Brandon, assistant

chief Steve Lucas, Lt. Norman Byrd, Lt. Paul King, Lt. Chris Matlock, firefighters Jon Farber and Chat Hart, dispatchers Richard Carpenter and Bo Finley and EMTs Donnie Robinson and Jimmy Shuffield.

The council also approved a resolution condemning property at 503 Vine Street.

Students prepping for jobs

■ Training program has Hot Spring County students busy.

A handful of students sit at tables, working on other projects while awaiting their turns for an electronic aptitude test. A single student sits at another table, quickly assembling and moving rivets and spacers. She has two minutes to complete this performance as many times as she can, and it seems that time is standing still.

In two weeks, these students will complete their work readiness training and join other youths at various job sites in Hot Spring County — sites that currently include the Malvern/Hot Spring

County Library, Malvern Police Department, Cooperative Extension Service, Boys and Girls Club, Warehouse, Family Market and USA Drug.

They are part of Malvern School District's job training program, Project Achievement, through the Workforce Investment Act. Project Achievement's grant funding has been reapproved for a third year, director Peggy Richardson said.

Eight new students are enrolled in the program now, including four out-of-school youth, which is the new component of the program. The two-week training period helps students and coordinators learn about each other. Student abilities, interests and aptitudes are identified and at the end of the training, coordinators will locate a job for the student.

Richardson said youth 19-21 years old who live in Hot Spring County — wherever they attended school — can now join Project Achievement. To reinforce the expansion, the program will collaborate with Ouachita Technical College's Adult Education center, and a staff person will be located at Adult Ed specifically for the out-of-school youth. Those youth are placed in appropriate training, such as GED classes or the WAGE (Workforce Alliance for Growth in the Economy) program at Adult Ed and "will have the same opportunity as the younger in-school youth in that they can be placed in work experience in the community," according to the grant application.

So far, all Project Achievement students have completed some kind of course work in basic skills and become competent in such fields as career exploration, labor market research, preparing resumes, completing job applications and preparing for the job interview. Supervisors at the student's work site evaluate the student on qualities including being punctual, attending regularly, attitude and appearance, interpersonal relationships and effective task completion.

And the student employees don't cost the employer anything — the grant through the Workforce Investment Act pays student wages.

Jasmine Hawkins, 16, is a sophomore at Malvern High School. She's been involved in Project Achievement for about a year and now works at the Hot Spring County Library, where she's been since August 2001.

She works at the circulation desk and reshelves books. During the school year, she works three hours on Tuesdays and Saturdays and one hour the other four days the library is open. During summer months, she can work more hours.

Before working at the library, she was briefly placed at the Boys and Girls Club But she said she enjoys the library and wants to remain there.

"I wanted to get a job, and (Project Achievement) was the only way to get one at my age," she said.

Richardson and Vickie Wickliffe said if students are placed in a job site but feel they would be better suited to another site, Richardson can try to arrange a transfer.

Part of the preparatory classes new enrollees take is an aptitude test. Rhonda Stroud of the Adult Education center tested the students on eye/hand/foot coordination and finger dexterity. The coordination test was 45 seconds long; the dexterity test took two minutes. "It's probably the longest two minutes of your life," Stroud warned the students.

Project Achievement is based on the realization that not all students are college bound, but all need skills to find employment. Therefore, like the WAGE program that Adult Education hosts, Project Achievement helps students identify and improve skills — such as dexterity — that they will need for various jobs.

Richardson said the in-school program is currently at capacity. The out-of-school program, though, has 16 openings. Youth ages 19 -21 who need employment guidance or direction can contact Richardson at 501-332-7581.

City Council looks at '24-hour' service

■ Mayor Northcutt says some cities are dying, but Malvern is in good shape.

The Malvern City Council's finance committee on Monday discussed funding a computer system to link all city offices.

At the June 10 council meeting, two women from Ouachita Technical College's CISCO Networking Academy presented information about the system. According to that plan, city hall would be the axis of a wireless network, with secondary networks to include the police department, fire departments, chamber of commerce, street department and water department. All departments would connect to the Internet through the city hall server.

The system, Malvern Mayor Steve Northcutt said, would allow people to check on city information and business 24 hours daily.

Northcutt presented the finance committee with a \$29,137 package proposal, including \$18,304 base salary plus benefits, for the CISCO employee if the city council approves the plan.

The cost of the networking project was estimated at about \$37,000, including new computers. The police department had requested 14 computers to replace several outdated models; however, Northcutt was notified Monday afternoon that the department was approved for a block grant of \$11,945, which Northcutt said can be used to purchase the new computers. That will reduce the funds needed to establish CISCO.

Northcutt also said whomever the city hires to

operate the CISCO system would be responsible for computer repair and training and Internet maintenance and could be cross-trained as a grant-writer.

Council and committee members Steve Smith and Jan Glidewell said the project is necessary. "If we're going to grow, we've got to move forward," Smith said.

The project will be further considered at the agenda meeting next week.

In other business, Northcutt said the city is doing well on its budget. When preparing the budget, the city planned for less state turnback funding than expected. It's been a blessing — Northcutt said other cities "are literally dying" because they planned for more state turnback. And cities have already been told that next year's turnbacks may be even lower.

Both Malvern and Hot Spring County will benefit from sales tax when Duke Energy goes online later this summer. The plant is gas-powered, which means they'll pay a one-cent county sales tax for gas. Duke officials predict that cost to be \$600,000 annually. One-third of that will go to the city. About the same amount is expected when Tractebel, the other power plant under construction in the county, goes online.

Northcutt also said the state Highway Department has listed the Ouachita River Bridge construction cost at about \$3 million. Malvern's part is 20 percent, based on the AHTD honoring an old commitment to pay 80 percent instead of the new 70 percent match limit. Northcutt credited Sen. Steve Faris for pursuing the project, which will replace a bridge that washed away in the 1990 flood.

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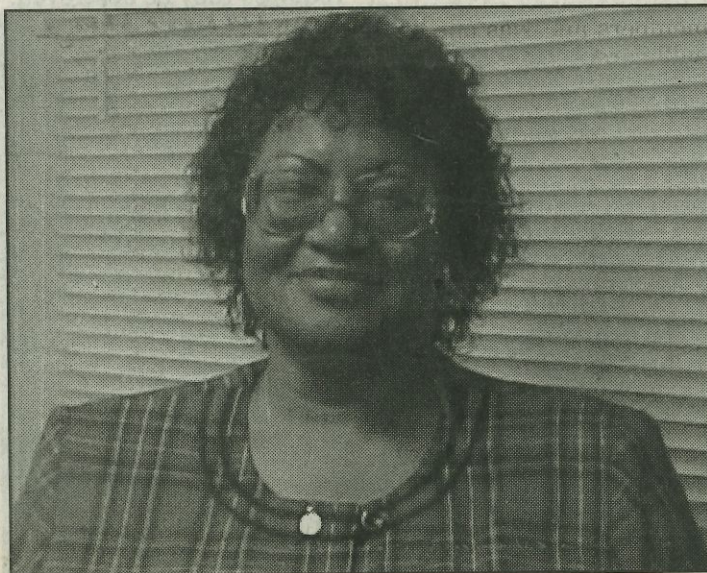

Malvern City Council wants Cisco

The Malvern City Council voted to establish a Cisco computer system linking all city offices and providing constant computer access to city information.

Two students from Ouachita Technical College presented data about the system at the council's June meeting. Following a recommendation by the Finance Committee, the council voted to hire an employee to coordinate the system. That employee will bid out for the equipment and will also be a grant writer for the

city. The Cisco network's cost is expected to range from low to mid-\$30,000 and the network will be 10,000 times faster than a 56K modem, Malvern mayor Steve Northcutt said.

Councilman Steve Smith said graduates of the Cisco training system can obtain jobs paying \$40,000 and more but said the \$18,304 salary, with the city's additional benefit package, should be suitable.

The council passed a resolution condemning five properties. A building at 331 South Main — the corner of Main and Page — is

leaking, floors are soft and bricks are broken at the corner of the building. Nearby, 114 East Page has been overtaken by vines, which are beginning to choke power lines; the roof has fallen in and there's a lot of debris inside, code enforcement officer Len Dawson said.

A house at 1118 Babcock was condemned because of its collapsed front porch and overgrown surroundings. The owner has since mowed the yard, Dawson said, and has said he will eradicate the building. At 209 Babcock near Veneer, a front porch has fallen off,

doors stand open and the house has been gutted. The owners have not decided what they want to do, Dawson said. And at 418 Vine Street, the porch has fallen from a house whose owner is deceased. Dawson said he hasn't seen the interior.

The council reappointed Kristi Norris to the Malvern Parks Commission as the Ward 2 representative.

By recommendation of the Finance Committee, the council raised the building department clerk's salary to what the previous employee had been making and

moved Burl Lamkins from the AARP program and hired him as a part-time city employee to work 64 hours per two-week pay period.

Northcutt reported to the council that the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department has authorized the city to bid Phase II of the sidewalk renovation project.

This should be bid within the next week, he said, and will complete the brick sidewalks down Main Street.

The council will hold a special meeting Wednesday for a one-item agenda.

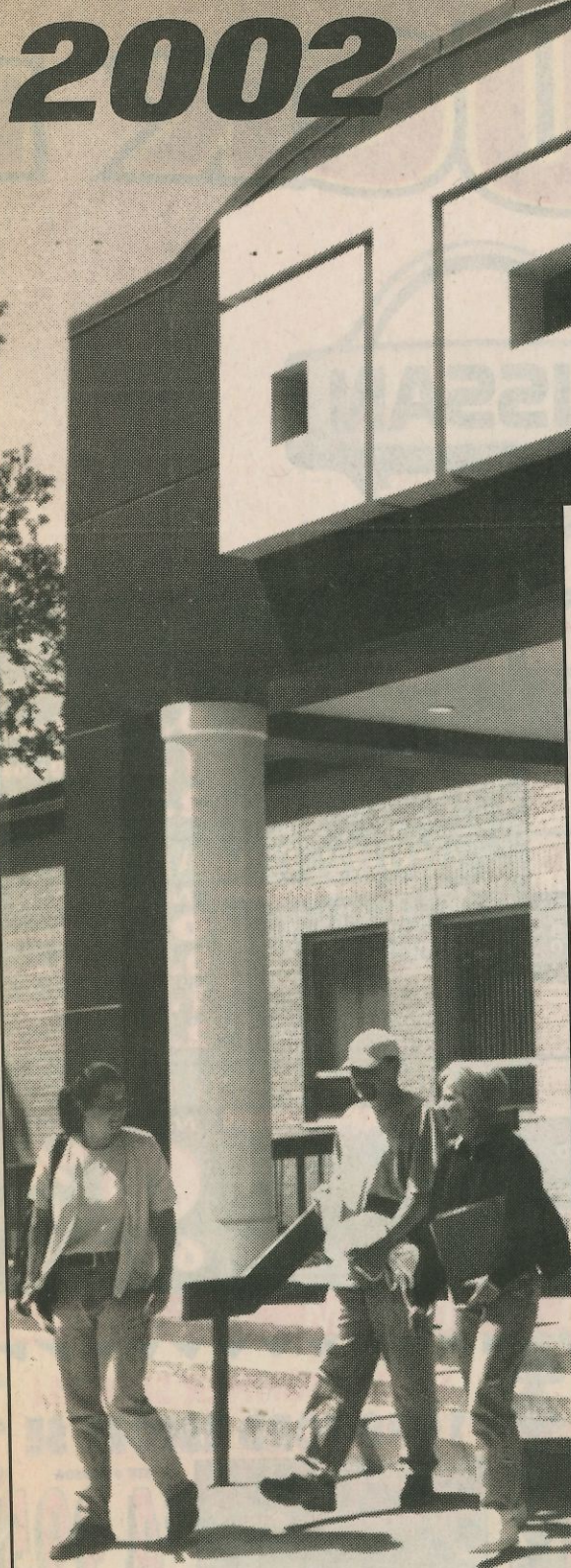

When it comes to service, the Lions International is one of the most famous and prestigious clubs around. They have clubs all over the world that are devoted to the club motto of "We serve."

The newest Hot Spring County affiliate to Lions International is the Bismarck club, which was chartered in May 2000. The Bismarck club now has 26 members and is already very active among Lions International.

In January, the Bismarck Lions Club will host the Midwinter Forum, a statewide Lions mini-convention, at DeGray Lodge. John Gillham, the club's president, estimates that the forum will bring about 200 or more Lions Club members from all across the state to the Bismarck area.

They work through the Lions World Service for Blind in Little Rock and the Mid South Eye Center in Memphis. The Memphis center applies cutting edge technology for surgeries and eye care. The Bismarck club can refer people to the Center and help provide them the care they need at no cost to the patient.

The club is considering forming a Leo club, a junior Lions Club, at Bismarck to get high school students involved in community service.

In Magnet Cove, the Lions Club works with the high school for fundraisers and events. They raise money by operating the school's concession stand during basketball games.

Other money raised by the club comes from the sale of picnic tables built by club members. C.J. Sexton and Kenneth Hammonds build six-by-eight foot picnic tables of treated wood that are bolted together. The picnic table sales have been a fundraiser for the club for the past three and a half years.

Sexton is one of the club's charter members from when it was founded 53 years ago. It was originally formed in Jones Mill before moving to Magnet Cove.

Currently, the club has 12 active members. The officers for the club include Glen Coston as president, Jerry Skinner as vice president, Robert Lee as secretary/treasurer, Ray Shield as lion tamer and Jim Burton as tail twister.

"We are a small, but very active club," Coston said. "We try to provide as much help as we possibly can."
